Students are tested and placed in these courses according to achievement and ability. Advanced Placement language courses will be offered.</i></p>

Are languages required, and if so, for which years? 	<p>Latin, French, and Chinese. Latin is required of all students beginning in 5th grade. Starting in 8th grade, students may add French or Chinese. All Upper School students are required to succeed at the third level of Latin and the second level of French or Chinese.</p>

All students are required to study Latin through Middle School and through the third level of high school.</p>

What is the dress code and how is it enforced? 	<p>Yes, our students wear uniforms as described below:</p> <p>For Boys</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A white, collared, long- or short-sleeved polo shirt with school insignia. A white long- or short-sleeved button down shirt without insignia may be worn underneath the school sweater. Blue cardigan sweater with school insignia. Blue V-neck sweater vest with school insignia. Khaki pants (khaki shorts may be worn once the warm weather dress code is announced)

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Clean, preferably solid-colored shoes in good repair. • Solid colored socks must be worn. <p>For Girls</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A white, collared long- or short-sleeved polo shirt with school insignia. A white long- or short-sleeved button down shirt without insignia may be worn underneath the blue sweater. • Blue cardigan sweater with school insignia. • Blue V-neck sweater vest with school insignia • Khaki pants (khaki shorts may be worn once the warm weather dress code is announced) • Khaki skirt (not shorter than 1” above the knee) • Clean, preferably solid-colored shoes in good repair. • Solid colored socks must be worn. <p>For all students:</p> <p>T-shirts worn beneath blouses or shirts must be plain white without lettering or pictures and may not extend beyond the normal sleeve length or waist length of the blouse or shirt. In addition, uniforms are to be worn with careful attention to proper presentation and appearance as regards size. In addition, students must adhere to the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NO excessive jewelry. Jewelry should be modest and in no way impede upon the learning process. • NO hats, gloves, coats or other outer-wear may be worn in class. <p>A student who arrives at school not in proper attire for the day will receive demerits for uniform violation and will be asked to change into the appropriate attire. If a change of clothes is not available, the School may call the parent or guardian to pick the student up and take him or her home for the balance of the day. Students must adhere to the dress code at all times while in the school building. Failure to adhere to the dress code will result in the accumulation of demerits; chronic non-adherence will lead to suspension from school. Finally, continued failure to adhere to the dress code shall be taken as insubordination and may necessitate removal from school.</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Transportation to and from school? Additional cost? 	<p>Yes, we provide transportation to and from school. Two bus routes operate in the morning and at dismissal time. Each route picks students up at the specified location and take them directly to the Upshur and Decatur sites. <p>does the school have and how much does it cost? Who runs these programs?</p>	<p>Thursday afternoons. Parents are charged \$10 per afternoon of the program. The school year is broken up into three seasons of after-school, which coincides with the three sports seasons available to students in grades 7-10. A variety of activities are offered, such as an Arabic class, martial arts, photography, environmental club, tutoring, and study hall and each activity is offered 1-2 days per week. Individual activities are run by faculty or outside providers. Students sign up for these programs at the beginning of each season through the Coordinator of After-School Programs.</p>
